

NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. -The Board of Trade at its meeting last night assured by resolution the South that the Northern merchants would heartily cooperate in any movement looking to the advancement of the business interests of the Southern cities. The board has also protested against the Harbor Master's tonnage tax, but no reply has been received from Governor Geary. It is thought that a meteorological signal system will be adopted at Lewes, Delaware. Mr. Morris called attention to the fact that the interests of the land demand that freight depots should be kept in close communication with the mercantile section of the city. The board also believe in furtherance of the interests of the grain trade that depots should be established at tide-water. The Pennsylvania Railroad contemplates such a movement, and the board will memorialize Congress on the subject. -A mass meeting of Irish citizens was held at Seventh and Carpenter streets last night, and regarding O'Rossa, Burke & Co. are desired to their noble bearing when confronting the minions of the law, and constancy under penal torture, they (the Irish citizens) proceeded to resolve to organize a society for the accomplishment of Irish liberty, to be called the "Irish Confederation." Speeches were made, and the meeting adjourned to meet again next Monday night. -A petition, backed by A. G. Cattell and others, was submitted to the Councils Finance Committee last night, asking them to pay \$117,000, that being the sum lost by Henry Simons in the building of the Chestnut street bridge, owing to a rise in the price of the material. The paper was referred to a sub-committee. The committee will report negatively the ordinance increasing the pay of the foremen of the P. F. D. to \$1000. An appropriation of \$10,000 for the repair of Girard Avenue Bridge will be recommended. It was also agreed to report in favor of giving \$38,000 to the Highway Department for the grading of streets. Foreign Affairs. -Gambetta soon returns to France. -La Liberté asserts that Felix Pyat was yesterday arrested. -Emperor William goes to-day to Ems to meet Czar Alexander. -Two vessels, with yellow fever among their crews, have arrived in English ports. -A new loan will be offered in France on the 26th inst., bearing five per cent. interest at 82. -Yesterday, in Germany, was devoted to thanksgiving in all the churches, which were crowded. -The Imperial Guard is being reorganized in France under the name of the Republican Guard. -The reorganization of the Central Committee and its proclamations in Paris excite great dismay. -Sixty-eight arrests of the members of the International Society were made on Sunday night at Brussels. -The British House of Lords yesterday debated the declaration of Paris of 1856 abolishing privateering. -During the last two days twenty-nine officers of the Commune have been arrested, of whom half are foreigners. -One hundred and eighty thousand French prisoners still remain in Germany, and they are now returning home at the rate of 3500 each day. -Twenty-five hundred women convicted of setting fire, or attempting to set fire, to buildings in Paris, have been sentenced to transportation to New Caledonia. -A special despatch from Rome says that a plot for the assassination of the Pope has been discovered, and that it was concocted by the International Society. -Indications of a renewal of the insurrection in Paris rapidly multiply. The working-men openly insult the soldiers and attempt at assassination and incendiarism continue. -The Paris correspondent of the London Times writes that the International Society, from which sprang the Paris Commune, numbers 2,500,000 members in Europe. -Members of the International Society are said to have been ringleaders in the outbreak against the friends of the Pope during their demonstrations at Brussels on Sunday. -The National Assembly yesterday passed a bill giving the natives of Alsace and Lorraine, residing in France, the right to vote, and also making them eligible to the Assembly. Domestic Affairs. -Intensely warm weather is now prevailing on the Pacific coast. -Little or nothing interesting to the reading public was developed yesterday in the Latham Methodist Book Concern investigation. -The Governor of Indian Territory says that it is evident that, during the coming summer, there will be witnessed the most extensive ravages on the frontier of Texas, as the Indians have made great preparations for committing depredations.
