The census of England, Wales, and Ireland is completed, and the population of England and Wales is officially stated at 22,700,000, and that of Ireland at 5,400,000.

A letter from the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of Arras to the Assembly, demanding the resumption of French protection of Rome, has been presented to that body.

The recent speech of M. Thiers is said to have produced an excellent impression in consequence of the clearness of his financial statement, and the announcement that two hundred millions of francs will be set apart annually for a sinking fund.
