

THE CAMDEN AND AMBOY RAILROAD LEASE—SHOULD IT BE CONSUMMATED?

To the Editor of the Evening Telegraph. I have no expectation of being able to "storm Gibraltar with a pop-gun," no expectation, and but little hope that anything I can say will arrest what appears to be almost an accomplished fact; as I conceive, the most disastrous fact possible, for the commercial interests of Philadelphia, the transfer to Jersey City of all the facilities of the great Pennsylvania Railroad for building up at our own wharves a great, an unlimited foreign trade, on the solid and immovable basis of the cheapest possible supply of the consumption of the world, with the vast, the unlimited export products of the great tributary West.

When this shall be consummated, let us ask that the name of that railroad be changed to "Jersey City, New York, and Great Western Railroad," and that the pile of buildings on Third and Fourth streets and Willing's alley be removed to some suitable location beyond our limits, where they shall not insult our citizens by a constant reminder of lost opportunities and false pretenses.

In order to place upon record these views, which I have personally urged as I have had opportunity, I have embodied, very inadequately and feebly, what I deem to be the true relations of this Camden and Amboy lease to the commercial interests primarily, and to all the interests mediately, whether manufacturing, mechanical, or vested, of this city. I throw them out tentatively, as a possible means of arousing the attention of public capitalists and business men, to view of this matter not generally entertained, but capable, to my apprehension, of all but absolute demonstration. My first proposition is that all railroads, being institutions, artificial bodies, created by the State for public use; endowed by the State under the exercise of its highest sovereign prerogative, that of creating charters; with the vast privilege, the power to take to their own private property, without the assent and against the will of its owner, are thereby made and constituted public corporations, having a dual responsibility, owing duties as well to the public as to their stockholders.

Second. The Pennsylvania Railroad was originally built from Philadelphia to Harrisburg by the State, and from Harrisburg to Pittsburgh by capital, mostly Philadelphia capital, raised with great labor and exertion on the part of the citizens, and a heavy subscription to its stock by the city in its corporate capacity, when the pecuniary success of this, as of all other railroads, was by no means assured; and as built, as the directors in their last report officially acknowledged to promote the trade and business of Philadelphia, and therefore the Pennsylvania Railroad is peculiarly a public institution of Philadelphia, and owes to it and to its business interests, besides (even before) its duty to its stockholders, a peculiar duty. If this is so, then the city government, with the citizens at large, have a perfect moral right, to interpose a positive prohibition against any arrangement of the directors of that corporation which shall have for its full development as a certain—even a probable—consequence, the infliction of lasting injury on the business, present or prospective, of this city, and any such arrangement should not be devised upon the stockholders of that or any other road, and be determined by them by stock vote as a mere question of profit and loss.

Now let us apply these positions to this Camden and Amboy lease. The Pennsylvania Railroad has connections with New York through the New Jersey roads, both by way of Allentown and by the Junction Railroad, without touching our city proper. They now propose to absorb the New Jersey companies, and to switch off over them to New York all their heavy freight, at an expense of some two and a half or three millions per year, and to expend a sum of money at Harsimus Cove at which the United Companies have stood aghast and paralyzed, not less than five millions, and beyond that, a sum to which no present limit can be set, for bringing the ground above water and building up there a vast depot, etc., for the receiving and shipping of Western products.

Now this can be accomplished and made profitable only and just in proportion as it shall antagonize the commercial advancement and export trade of this city, to the promotion of which that corporation owes instead the devotion of its best energies and exertions.

THE OPPOSITE PICTURE. If the directors of the Pennsylvania Railroad would issue \$5,000,000 of stock pledged to the improvement of the seventy acres of land owned by them—bought by them for the purpose, and above water—on the South Delaware front of our city, and would improve the same by suitable and sufficiently capacious docks, wharves, storerooms, and sidings, having previous to this, cut their own road from West Philadelphia thereto; and would erect storerooms and an elevator of sufficient capacity and approved construction, and would thereby, and by reliable assurances, pledge themselves to a loyal and continuous devotion of the vast capacities of that road to the purpose of making Philadelphia, at whatever cost, the best market for the supply of the whole world with the enormous and enormously increasing Southwestern, Western, and Northwestern products at the lowest cost possible, with reasonable profit to the road. The merchants and citizens of Philadelphia would, on instant notice, take such stock for such uses, and would demonstrate to the President and directors of that Philadelphia corporation, and to managers of the men to handle and to manage all they could bring to them, and would prove that the assertion of their late report that an outlet through New York is necessary for that purpose is not well founded; but that, giving them the produce, they will guarantee the men, the money, and also the ships to handle and to dispose of all they can bring to them, and as much more if offered from other sources. Merchandise commands ships, commands money, secures men.

Now let us put the whole matter into the form of a short preamble and a short resolution, which ought to regulate the determination and conduct of our city, Legislature, and our citizens:—

Whereas, This is the critical epoch in our commercial life, the epoch when it is to be decided whether the powerful, the almost omnipotent energies of our own railroad shall be loyally and intelligently employed to the use of its proper masters, or shall be blindly and improvidently driven into the service of a rival community; when the question is to be decided, and decided for all time, whether Jersey City or the whole of Philadelphia shall stem with the renewed life of a great foreign commerce, a commerce essential to the maintenance and proper extension of our manufacturing and mechanical property; therefore

Resolved, That the City Councils and the citizens at large will energetically use all the power and influence they possess to prevent this suicidal transfer; and the managers of the Pennsylvania Railroad be invoked by every consideration of duty and patriotism to reconsider and change their intention, and withdraw their proposition before it is too late; and the business men and capitalists of the city that they earnestly examine the subject, and, if these views are correct, that they bestir themselves to prevent these unhappy results.

Since the above was written I perceive that resolutions in accordance with the views above expressed have been introduced into Common Council and referred to the Committee on Railroads. It is to be hoped and expected that Mr. Bazzy, chairman of that committee, will give it early and efficient consideration.
