

## LATE FOREIGN.

**NEW YORK.** June 14.—The Steamer "Lion" arrived to-day from Liverpool and London dates May 10.  
**BOSTON.** May 30.—There was much excitement caused here by the attack on the small merchant vessel Bell Isle, by a French war brig. The English vessel selected to host her colors, when the French vessel fired, killing one seaman. The case is under the consideration of the Admiralty.

**PHILADELPHIA.** The Minister has announced that the United States will sign the Dallas-Clarendon treaty, and that the new conditions of Washington are under consideration.

The news by the overland mail from Europe is unimportant. The French legislature has passed a bill establishing three lines of transatlantic steamers. The death of the Marshall Radetzky is generally anticipated.

It was reported that the French, Russian, Prussian, and Sardinian Commissioners threatened to withdraw from the principles, should those parts persist in removing Vogarick from his post at Molavia.

There are rumors of coolness existing between the Emperor of Russia and Count Mornay, which will likely interfere with the settlement of the commercial treaty between Russia and France.

**TRIPOLI.** May 28.—Advice from Bougie means the return of some of the English regiments from Persia.

**Admiral Seymour** was at Hong Kong awaiting reinforcement which were looked for in the course of a few weeks.

An ambassador extraordinary from France to China, sailed from Toulon on the 28th.

General Cavaignac and several other Republicans will probably become candidates to represent Paris in the new corps legislative.

Dispatches from Algeria mention that the French expeditionary corps had attacked Beni Rattan, on the 23d of May at three different directions, and had captured the position after two hours fighting. The advanced guard had penetrated into Kabrit.

The Mexican envoy has not yet been received by the Queen of Spain and the arrangement of the differences between the two governments has it is said encountered many difficulties.

Private advice from London state that the British government have generously offered another vessel, equal in all respects to the Argonaut, to take the place of the Niagara, in laying the Ocean Telegraph cable.

**LIVERPOOL MARKETS.**—Biscuits.—The market is reported firm; some Circumstances, however, say they are dull, and Flour has a declining tendency. Corn has declined 31. Mixed Corn is quoted at 33s 6d and 39s.

**Seizure of the Key to the Red Sea.**

The last foreign news announces that the East India Company have taken possession of the Island of Perim. This act was one of those summary proceedings which are very much condemned by British statesmen and British newspapers when other than their own particular interest is concerned, but which are often justified by the motive. A British ship was wrecked and pillaged by the natives. The East India Company, believing that the authority existing on the island was insufficient to give protection to shipwrecked seamen, took possession of the Island and has placed a garrison there. The Red Sea is now open to all.

**Perim commands this highway,** and unless the English can pass without the permission of those who possess it, it is situated between Arabia and Africa, on the very point at which the Red Sea commences, and it divides the strait into two channels.

The passage to the east, on the side of Asia, is only three miles wide; but to the west on the African side, is about ten or twelve. On the southwest, towards the western entrance of the straits, the island forms one of the finest ports imaginable. It is a mile in length, and half a mile in breadth, and the depth varies from 7 to 25 fathoms.

### THE MAIN LINE—REPEAL.

It is now settled beyond a doubt that the sale of the Public Works is to be an important issue in the coming election. The Democratic party has placed itself in a position of decided and unequivocal hostility to the measure. At its State Convention last week, a resolution condemning the sale was passed without a dissenting voice.

An amendment was offered to the effect that opposition to a sale at this time should not be construed into opposition to a heretofore upon more favorable terms, was indefinitely postponed. Many of the larger and lesser lights of the party, taking their cue from the Convention, have already taken up and thrown to the breeze the rallying cry of "Repeal."

Opposition merely to the present bill providing for a sale, would not be a cause of much surprise, for it must be confessed that the bill was compelled to go over. The evil, however, has grown so fast, that now there is no escape.
