

RESOLUTION Proposing Amendments to the Constitution written. of the Commonwealth.



onstitution to be designated as article eleven es follows: ARTICLE XI. OF PUBLIC DEBTS:

BEGTION 1. The State may contract debts, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or a tdifferent periods of time, shall never exceed seven ferent periods of time, shall never exceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars and the monbe applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.

Sec. 2 In addition to the above limited pow-

er the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to redeem the present outstanding in-debtedness of the state; but the money arising pondency, Cosuveness, Dund and Bleeding Piles.
