RESOLUTION Proposing Amendments to the Constitution

of the Commonwealth. Resolved by the Senate and House of Bepre sentatives of the Commonwdalth of Pennsylva-nia in General Assembly met: That the following amendments are proposed to the constitu-tion of the commonwealth, in accordance with the provisions of the tenth article thereof. First Amendment,

There shall be an additional article to said constitution to be designated as article sleven as follows:---

OF PUBLIC DEBTS.

BECTION 1, The State may contract debis, to supply casual deficits or failures in revenues, or to meet expenses not therwise provided for, but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at difrent periods of time, shall never exceed seven forence periods of time, shall hever exceed as the hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the mon-cy arising from the creation of such debts, shall be applied to the purpose for which it was ob-ftained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to ne other purpose whatever. SEC. 2 In addition to the above limited pow-

er the State may contract debts to repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or to redeem the present outstanding indebtedness of the state; but the money arising from the contracting of such debts, shall be apof to tepsh on prose for which it was raised,,

SEC. 3. Except the debts above specified, in sections one and two of this article, no liebt, whatever shall be created by; or on behalf of the state.

Sac. 4 To provide for the payment of the present debt, and any additional debt contracted as aforesaid, the legislature shall, at its first session, after the adoption of this amendment. create a sinking fund, which shall be sufficient to pay the accruing interest on such debt, and annually to reduce the principal thereof by a sum not less than two hundred and fifty thousand dollars; which sinking fund shall consist of the net annual income of the public works from time to time owned by the state, or the promative. ceeds of the sale of the same, or any part thereof, and of the income or proceeds of shie of stocks owned by the state, together with other funds, or resources, that may be designated by The said sinking fund may be increased from time to time, by assigning to it any part of the taxes, or other revenues of the state, not required for the ordinary and current expenses of government, and unless in case of war, invaaiou or insurrection, no part of the said sink-ing fund shall be used or applied otherwise than in extinguishment of the public debt, until the amount of such debt is reduced below the

sum of five millions of dollars. Sic. 5. The credit of the common wealth shall not in any manner, or event, be pledged, or losned to, any individual, company, corporation or association; nor shall the commonwealth hereafter become a joint owner, or stockholder, in any company, association, or corporation.
