

**Kansas.**

We find in the Lawrence Republican of the 5th a table of the official returns of the late election in Kansas, so far as they have been received up to the 31st, from which we learn that the Republicans received 82,244 votes, the Democrats 80,236 votes, and the Unionists 12,450. This is exclusive of the 1600 fraudulent votes in Johnson county, and the 1200 of the same kind in McPherson county, which are known to be fraudulent, and about 100 in Marshall Co., besides many more which have not yet been exposed. It is said that some 2000 Missourians went over the border to vote, which, deducted from the actual total of 80,000, would leave 182,400. Out of some 30 counties heard from, the Republicans have carried all but Leavenworth, Atchison, Marshall, Johnson and Bourbon, and as the latter officers were elected for each county, they have thus secured possession of all the offices in the great majority of the counties. The free State vote is much less than it would have been, in consequence of large numbers of actual settlers being disqualified from exercising the right of suffrage by the regulations. If they could all vote the aggregate vote probably would exceed the whole number polled at the late contest by both sides. As it is, their total will probably reach 9000.

St. Louis, Nov. 10. Mr. Lander, chief engineer of Magnolia, wagon road survey arrived at Washington on Saturday. The expedition has gone into winter quarters at Wind River, near South Pass. Mr. Lander corroborates previous reports relative to the destruction of the Government trains by the Mormons. In consequence of new discoveries and explorations by Lander's party, the military force abandoned the valley by the open plains of Western Utah, and near Malade Pass, where they were much harassed by the Indians. Mr. Lander has obtained many valuable specimens in the destruction of the valley.

The Senate bill arrived at Independence on Saturday. Business was dull, and money scarce. The party encountered a snow storm on this side of Fort Union. The grass and water were abundant on the plains. The Cheyenne Indians were around both and Abilene post on Walnut creek; they were very much alarmed and were anxious to make peace. The intelligence from that country confirms the report of the destruction of the government trains by the Mormons.

The Senate bill which has been before the House for several days, and the bill for the payment of the interest on the State debt, passed the Senate Saturday night. Kansas advisers state that the Constitution adopted by the Convention by a vote of 100 to 80, and about a dozen amendments. The whole number of delegates was 100, consequently the Constitution was adopted by a minority of the Convention. The majority and minority reports of the Convention to schedule were merged into one schedule which provides for a convention to be held on the 21st of December to ratify or reject the Constitution, the voting to be by ballot, and the votes cast to be endorsed by the Convention with slavery, and a Constitution without slavery, also an election to be held on the first Monday of January next for the election of State and Congressional tickets.

The Lawrence correspondent of the Kansas Constitution which is almost identical with the one adopted. He also says that no free-state men will vote on the 21st of December.

St. Louis, Nov. 11. The Lecompton Convention of the Republicans says that the Convention agreed on the 7th. A practical government, with Gen. Calhoun as Governor, has been formed, to go into operation immediately. The Convention passed a resolution that all bills which are the only sections that will be submitted to the people. It is thought by the design to get the Convention accepted by Congress before the assembling of the Territorial Legislature. Gen. Walker has been appointed to convene an extra session to meet the contingency of the adjournment of the State. The Constitution provides for 45 Representatives and 15 Senators.

From Washington City. WASHINGTON CITY, Nov. 14. It has been ascertained that Great Britain has never recognized the jurisdiction of Costa Rica over the river San Juan, or the proposed route. All she desires is that Costa Rica shall have the right of navigation for the export of her produce by the river, and the frontier to be settled by free negotiation between the Governments. Some of the grants or contracts made by Costa Rica respecting the river route are sanctioned and approved by Great Britain. Lord Derby has advised the Government of Costa Rica not to make any grants or concessions pending the arrival in Central America of Sir Wm. Osely, who is expected immediately in Washington.

The New Arctic Expedition. The New York Journal of Commerce says: "We have before us, in manuscript, a letter from Capt. F. M. Clintock, commanding the Arctic expedition recently sent out by Lady Franklin. The last date is 'Off Ban's River', Greenland. More recent advices, however, had been received, which left him at Lively, Greenland, on the 4th of August—all well. He was prepared to leave, as the ice was making fast."

The Cholera, which is raging in Hamburg, has found its way aboard this emigrant ship. The Bark *Ellis*, which arrived at New York on the 13th, had 23 deaths on the passage. The arrival of another vessel was reported, with 31 deaths.
