RESOLVED, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That in case any State shall not have complied with the said recommendation, the marshal in such State, under the direction of the judge of the district, be authorized to hire a convenient place to serve as a temporary jail, and to make the necessary provision for the safe-keeping of prisoners committed under the authority of the United States, until permanent provision shall be made by law for that purpose; and the said marshal shall be allowed his reasonable expenses in sourced for the above purposes to be paid out of the pences incurred for the above purposes, to be paid out of the Treasury of the United States.
