From as accurate an effimate as could poffibly be obtained, the actual receipts of the ferries for a medium of five years laft paft, amount to iwelve hundred pounds, New-Jerley currency, per annum, three-fourths of that fum will confequently produce an immediate income of goo pounds per ann. This may fairly be effimated as the fmalleft profit that can be calculated upon. The advancing population of the United States, the increasing intercourfe between the two cities of New-York and Philadelphia, the facility which the conftruction of these bridges will give to travelling, the eafy communication thereby offered with the flate of New-York, on the western fide of the Hudson, are all important circumftances, which must neceffarily tend rapidly to accumulate the profits of the bridges.
