It is to be understood in each case, that all losses sustained by the deprivations of the enemy, or by means of the troops of the United States, shall be paid for at the prices of the articles captured or destroyed, on the depositions of two or more credible characters, and the certificate of a commissionable officer, ascertaining the circumstances of the loss, and the amount of the articles for which compensation is claimed.
The contract for the above supplies will be made either for one year, or for two years, as may appear

eligible. Persons disposed to contract will therefore confine their offers to one year, or they may make their propositions so as to admit an election at the term of two years. The offers may comprise all the places which have been specified, or a part of them only.
