THE GREAT ADVANCE IN COTTON .- This article has reached a price in the New York market as a staple. The Herald of Saturday save : Dav before yesterday it suddenly jumped to eighty-nine cents in the forenoon, and in the afternoon sales six cents per poind. A party who purchased in the forenoon, resold in the afternoon at a profit o \$40 per bale. At ninety-six cents per pound a bale of cotton is worth \$432. Before the war it sold at ten to twelve cents a pound or at \$45 or \$54 per bale. From present appearances it i possible that it may touch \$1 per pound, or \$450 per bale. The present price is higher than it was be-Bryant Edwards, in his history of the West Indies. quoted cotton grown in the Bahamas and other West India Islands in 1784 at two shillings and six pence sterling per pound-say about sixty-two and a half cents-which was picked or cleaned $\{\overline{1S}\}$ with the fingers.
