Mr. Phillips' Tariff Bill. The Washington correspondent of the New York Tribune, furnishes the following abstract of the tariff bill prepared by Hon. Henry M. Phillips.

LANCASTER ELECTION. The municipal election in Lancaster, Pa., on Tuesday last, resulted in the election of Captain Sanderson of the Intelligence, the Democratic opponent for Mayor.

APPOINTMENTS BY THE PRESIDENT. The President has appointed the Hon. Wilson McCandless, of Allegheny county, Judge of the United States District Court for the Western District of Pennsylvania.

Donovan, who was convicted at Harrisburg for assault and battery on Church, a member of the Legislature from Philadelphia, was sentenced on the 1st instant, to three months imprisonment, to pay a fine of \$200, and to give bail in the sum of one thousand dollars to keep the peace.

The Latest News.

From Mexico we hear of a most extraordinary intervention on the part of the commanders of the British and French naval forces at Vera Cruz.

The old tariff provided also for credits of forty and eighty days for import duties, but the new one exacts cash payments.

From Europe we have another budget of deeply interesting news. The war panic which was set on foot by the expression of the Emperor to the Austrian Emperor.

From France we have no further direct movement in the present war on the part of the Government but the Paris journals all of which are in the interest of the Emperor.

From Austria we learn that public feeling is much disturbed on the subject of the threatened rupture with France.

In England, Parliament was to meet on the 23rd inst. The Irish prosecutions were still going on.

From Nicaragua, we have accounts of the active progress of negotiations between Sir William Grey Osely, on the part of Great Britain, and the Nicaraguan Government.
