By the steamer *Edna* at New York we have received European advices to the second inst. There had been no more fighting, and the allies continued their movements across the Minco unmolested. The Emperor Napoleon had changed his headquarters from Volta to Vallegio. The Sardinians had completed the investment of Peschiera from the Lago de Garda to the Minco. The Emperor of Austria was expected to remain in Italy. The loss of the French in the last battle of the Marston was 10,000 to 18,000 men. The Austrian loss was 24,000 killed, wounded and missing. The French General Drouot had seven of eight regiments, and very many superior officers were killed. The French infantry regiments were mostly out to pieces. The Piedmontese suffered severely as to be incapable of forming in the line of battle. The Vienna correspondent of the *London Times* writes on the 28th, that the days most glap before a complete truce of the armies of the Austrians would be very long. The same writer says that the Italian regiments in the Austrian army have become very difficult to manage. The men speak of desertion and desertion.
