On arriving in Ireland he was with other prisoners, sold as a slave and carried into that section of the country now known as Antrim. There his duty was the humble one of tending sheep; and this quiet and solitary occupation giving him a capital opportunity to think, he formed plans for future action At last he succeeded in escaping to Gaul, and reached once more his boyhood's home. His friends and relatives, as a matter of course, were delighted to see "charming Patrick," and he was placed in the College of Tours, where he studied diy inity and finally became a Priest. " Patri cus" did not fancy the cloister however; and resolved to return to the country of his captivity to preach to the heathen, who darkened that beautiful land.
