CORINTH, May 30. It is now ascertained that the evacuation committee, which has been acting since we were retreating southward last. The railroad bridge was burned, when we went to Grand Junction, and from thence south by the Memphis and New Orleans road.—Some ladies and citizens remain here. The citizens inform us that Richmond is evacuated, and that almost wholly deserted, all the stores being closed—with the exception of a few groceries.

It is ascertained that Van Dorn has a band of Indians under him.

Col. Jackson reports finding the road for miles through Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, and Texas, all the roads full of stragglers, who were being brought up as fast as possible. Probably from 2,000 to 3,000 have been brought in, and almost the entire Thirteenth Louisiana are now within our

power.
