At the conclusion of his remarks and after some preliminaries in regard to the meeting of the several Committees, the meeting adjourned, subject to a call from the Committee at seven o'clock on Saturday evening.

At the ringing of the bell our citizens again assembled at the Court House. In the absence of the President, Hon. James T. Hale was called to the Chair.

The Committee on enlistments reported ninety-six names on the roll, and before the meeting closed, the entire complement had been obtained.

The Rev. Mr. Barnard was called upon and addressed the meeting. He made a stirring appeal to the people to come forward and fill up the company to its maximum standard.

Mr. Edmund Blanchard, as Chairman of the Committee on Equipments, then reported, with appropriate remarks. He made a strong appeal to the people in behalf of his report, after which he reported the following resolutions:

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WAR NEWS.

From Gen. McClellan's Army. GEN. RENO KILLED. WASHINGTON Sept. 15. (By the Associated Press.)

After a very severe engagement the corps of Generals Hooker and Reno, have carried the heights commanding the Hagerstown road. The troops behaved magnificently. They never fought better.

Gen. Franklin has been engaged on the extreme left. I do not know the result except that the firing indicates progress on his part. The action continued till after dark and terminated leaving us in possession of the entire crest. It has been a glorious victory. I cannot yet tell whether the enemy will retreat during the night or appear in increased force in the morning.

I regret to add the gallant and able General Reno is killed. GEO. B. McCLELLAN. Major General.

Still Later. To H. W. Halleck, Commander in Chief. I have just learned from Gen. Hooker in the advance, who states that the information is perfectly reliable that the enemy is making for the river in a perfect panic, and Gen. Lee last night stated publicly that he must admit they had been shockingly whipped.

I am hurrying everything forward to endeavor to prevent their retreat to the utmost. G. B. McCLELLAN.

The Very Latest. Information has this moment been received completely confirming the rout and demoralization of the Rebel army. Gen. Lee is reported wounded and Gen. Gland wounded. General Hooker alone has over 1,000 prisoners, 700 having been sent to Frederick. It is stated that Gen. Lee gives his loss at 15,000. We are following as rapidly as the men can move.

G. B. McCLELLAN, PHILA., Sept. 17. The rebel force under rebel Gen. Jackson have taken Harper's Ferry and compelled Col. Miles to surrender.

Col. Miles was wounded. Gen. McClellan was but a few miles off at the time of surrender. Gen. McClellan attacked them in the rear cutting them off fearfully.

We have captured 8,000 prisoners. Two fine field batteries have been captured. Howell Cobb is among the prisoners.

There is said to be a terrible battle raging at or near Hagerstown and the dead and wounded are being taken into Hagerstown.

Bellefonte, Sept. 18th. A dispatch received at the telegraph office here, just as we were getting our forms ready for the Press, states: "We had a severe battle and glorious victory, 40,000 rebels killed, wounded and taken prisoners. Jackson and Hill reported captured. Harper's Ferry retaken by Gen. McClellan, with large number of prisoners."
