THE LENGTH OF THE WAR

No sane man, we presume expects to see the end of this war with this Administration, or with any body of its school and character.

The 'subjugation' of millions of people, with the confiscation of all their property, and the fraternization of them with negroes is so vast a job, that necessarily slow work must be made with it—very slow work—and that 'job' must be an intensely long one.

The more paper money we make, to work the job, the more paper money must be made to work it—and hence prices must go higher, and everything become dearer and dearer. We have a twenty years' war before us, upon the principle of negro fraternity and equality of confiscation, and extermination.

In two years and a half, we have exterminated and desolated the eastern slope of Virginia, the border counties in Missouri, a considerable portion of Louisiana—but it is eighteen hundred miles from the Potomac to the Rio Grande, and the desolation and extermination of fifty miles per year, for eighteen hundred miles, is a work of thirty-six years—the probable duration of the war, under the new Lincoln programme.

The war might be over, and would be over, with a change of administration, in six months—because a new administration, would change all this existing programme.

It would attempt, insist upon and enforce the Unity and indivisibility of the republic, and end with nothing short of it; but it would, at the same time, with the sword, carry the olive branch and so, leaving nothing for the south to fight for, divide that south, upon the principle of self-government, and in the end, voluntary bring back this south.

The conservative policy toward the south would be such, that, leaving the south nothing to fight for, no secession or war party could be maintained in that south.
