- The question as to who shall pay the duty required on receipts on any sums of money seaceding \$20, is dependent on theelreunstances attending the case. Ordinarily at law 80 perse a se bound to give a receipt for money paid. The receipt is an instrument of evidence medule only to the person to whom it is given. If he needs a receipt it is necessary for him to farmish the stamp or to stamp the receipt, if required, before it is signed. The person who receives the money is not obliged to give a receipt unless the other-party furnishes the proper stamp. If a person gives a receipt without requiring that the party to whom it is given shall furnish the stamp, the maker of the receipt must himself stamp the paper before he delivers it.
