The deficiency was blamed upon the Southern States for not paying their share of the Postal expenses, and was used as an argument to prove that we of the North would be better off seperated from the South than in connection with it. It was one of the chief strings upon which they played to awaken the feeling that has now ripened into war and bloodshed. It was used in speeches, in papers, in pamplilets, and appeals to show that the Southern States were a dead weight to our prosperity, and that the sooner we got rid of them the better it would be for the tax-phyers and people of the North. By a persistent effort they at length succeeded in driving the Southern States out of the Union. Since that time we have not been "encumbered keeping up non-paying routes for illiteral, overboaring slave drivers," as they saw proper to denoninate the people of the South, but have simply kept open our own routes, and even some of them have been closed and what is the state of the finances i the Post Office Department at this time? According to the report of the Post Master General, for the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1864, there is an excess of expenditures over receipts of two hundred and six thousand, five hundred and thirty two dollars, and forty-two cents.
