The War.

General Sherman has been chosen Secy. of War, and Mr. Wm. H. Seward is trying to reach Governor Andrew's desk. On February 20, he made a speech in which he gave his views on the subject. He was introducing the bill for the re-organization of the Great Seal, which he had proposed. The navy was making arrangements to receive him, and the steamer "Asia" left New York on the 20th. The "Asia" was to be used for the reception of the new cabinet, and the crew of the vessel were to be received by the president at the time of his arrival.
