The object of the meeting was then stated by the Chairman in a few appropriate and touching remarks, when, on motion, Jas. McManus, H. N. McAllister, R. G. Durham, Richard Conley, and J. D. Shugert, were appointed a committee to draft resolutions, who, after retiring a short time, reported the fellowing, which were unanimously adopted:

We have been called together to-day by an event which is as solemn and sorrowful, as it has been sudden and unexpected. years a member of this bar, and formerly an occupant of the bench in the 25th Judicial District, has been suddenly stricken down by death in the prime of life and the vigor of manhood. His career of honor and usefulness has terminated when least it was expooted to close, and when society seemed to need most those beneficial, genial and happy influences which he was accustomed to shed around him, cheering and gladdening the hearts of all with whom he came in contact, and making the world the better for his having lived in it.
