A CENTENARIAN. - We think we have the ldest man living in this county that is to be found in Pennsylvania, or, probably, in the United States. His name is Ulifistley Vanpool, and he is a resident of Halfilloon townthip. He was born on the 22d day of June. 1764, and was consequently, one hundred and eleven years old last June. We do not renember to have heard lately of any one livng who is older than this. Mr. Vanpool was in the neighborhood of 21 years of age at the breaking out of the Revolutionary war, and has a distinct remembrance of the stirring events of that period. He was in Philadelphia on the day that General Sir William Howe, the British commander in chief, made is triumphal entry into that city, after defeating our forces at Brahdywine and Gormantown. He was hot, personally, a par-ticipant in the ballies of the Revolution, but had two brothers in the American army; himself being obliged to stay at home and do the farming. Of General Washington, he has a clear and vivid remembrance, having often had the pleasure of seeing him .-He says the great General made a finer appearance on horse-back than, any man lie ever saw. He says Washington was a large, finely-forfaed, and powerfully built man with features handsome, though somewhat coarse. Altogether, he was one the noblest looking men of his time. He has also distinct recollection of the Marquis De La-Payette, the noble Frenchman, who crossed the sea to shed his blood in the cause of American independence. A great many other officers of that time are well remembered by him, and it is extremely interest. ing to hear him talk of the men and scenes

of that illustrious period. Mr. Vanpool is a tall man, though some what stooped now. We have seen many men at sixty-five and seventy, physically much older than he is. His health is still quite good, and he looks as though he might live ten or fifteen years yet. For the last two or three years, he has been troubled more or less with rheumatism, which is about the only thing of which he complains. Last harvest he worked in the field, some times using the cradle, and cutting ten or fifteen dozen a day, which, considering his rhoumatism and his immonee age, was cortainly remarkable. He is somewhat hard of bearing, and talks in strong and distinct tones. He says if it wasn't for the rhelima-tism, he believes he would be as good a man now as he was twenty years ago. The old man has always been an industrious worker. and the habit of labor still clings to hith, so that, although in comfortable pecuniary circumstances, he yet makes a hand at whatever is to be done. We sat and gazed with with wonder at this brave old relic of former generations, who still continues among us, older than the Government under which we live .- a connecting link between the present and the past. May he live for years to

Old Janten Taylor, a colored woman, and formerly a slave, now living in Milesburg, in this county, two miles from this place, is one hundred and six years of age. She distinctly remembers the Revolutionary war, and the evenis connected with it. She is regular "copperhead" and is always wishing herself back South with her "ole mass'r." She says "niggers weren" made to be free, and she don't believe they ought to be." She is an old darkey of some sense. Can any of our editorial breth ren produce two older specimens of humanity than these ? If so, we should like to hear of them.
