We would call the attention of the Commissioners to the fact that the fence on the side next Garman's Hotel is in an extremely bad condition, and should be at once repaired. Not only the grounds, but the young trees in the enclosure are in danger of injury, and we hope that the holes and broken places in the fence will be attended to before they get any worse.

THE RAIL READ. - It seems to be the genral impression throughout the county, that the reported compromise between the At alantic & Great Western and the Pennsyl vania Central, rail road companies, wil stop the building of the projected road through this county. Whether this im-pression is correctly formed or not, we have no means of ascertaining. The engineers, employed by the former of these companies to survey the proposed toutes, through this section have finished their work, and are now at this place, making out reports of their surveys. It is hardly probable that a company of men, would go to the enormous expense that the surveys of these youter have cost, to find a direct route, from New York to the great West, and after finding one, as we are assured they have,-easy to construct, of light grade, and almost direct -an air line we might say-that they would conclude to let the whole thing drop, and take off the hands of another company a road that is reported as never paying, and one that will lead them hundreds of

miles around, as the Sunbury nescessarily will. If the Atlantic and Great Western company, with all their boasted wealth. have concluded to play second fiddle to the Pennsylvania company, it is well enough for the people to know it. We believe there were guarantees made by men of standing in this part of the State, when the persons who held the charter of the Lewisburg Centre and Spruce Creek road, gave it over into the hands of the Atlantic and Great Western company, that the road should be built on the line that that charter called for. Where are these guarantees now, if we are thus to be cheated out of the prom-ised road A We do not say that the road is unt to be built, but from present appearances, and from reports of the compromise between the two companies that we see in oun-exchanges, the matter looks very suspicious. However we will hope for the best-that the Atlantic and Great Western has spunk and means enough to build its own roads, and that if it has not, that another company will soon be formed that will have, both means and determination,

THE STREETS .- There are portions of two streets in our town that need repairing badly. One is that portion of Bishop street between M'Bride's corner and the Catholic church. This place is in a miserable condition and is a disgrace to the borough .--In wet weather, vehicles cut into the mud up to the hubs and horses flounder through with much difficulty. It should be at once improved. Another place is that portion of Spring street between Brokerhoff's corner and Wagner's new residence. This is also in an exceedingly bad condition. We respecifully call the attention of the council to these two localities, and hope they wil see proper to have them made passable with safety and comfort.
