Handwriting, Peccoliarities.

It is a remarkable fact that no man can ever get rid of the style of hand-writing peculiar to his country. If he be English, he always writes in English style. If French, in French style; the style peculiar to his nation. Professor D. states: I am acquainted with a Frenchman who has passed all his life in England, who speaks English like one of our own countrymen, and writes it with ten times the correctness of ninety-nine in a hundred of us; but yet who can not, for the life of him, imitate our mode of writing. I knew a Scotch youth, who was educated entirely in France, and resided eighteen years in that country, mixed exclusively with French people, but who, although he had a French writing master, and perhaps never saw anything but French writing in his life, yet wrote exactly in the English style; it was really national instinct. In Paris all the writing-masters profess to teach the English style of writing, but with all their professions, and their exertions, they can never get their pupils to adopt any but the cramped hand of the French. Some pretend to be able to tell the characteristics of individuals from their hand-writing. I know not how this may be, but certainly the nation to which an individual belongs can instantly be determined by his hand-writing. The difference between the American or English and the French hand-writing is immense. A school-boy would distinguish at a glance. Mix together a hundred sheets of Manuscript written by a hundred Frenchmen and another hundred written by Englishmen or Americans, and no one could fail to distinguish every one of them, though all should be written in the same language and with the same pen and paper. The difference between Italian, Span and German hand-writings is equally decided. In fact, there is about as great a difference between the hand writing of different nations as in their languages. And it is a singular truth, that though a man may become identified with another nation, and speak his language as well, perhaps better, than his own, yet never can he succeed in changing his hand-writing to a foreign style.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?—The organist of a church in a neighboring city introduced into the Sabbath service recently an air from the opera of the "Grand Duchess," and another organist not long ago performed an air from the "Black Crook" during divine service, and was afterwards complimented by the minister on his "beautiful voluntary."
