Proceedings of the Judicial Conference.

The judicial conference of the 25th judicial district met at Bellefonte, on Tuesday, August 18th, 1868.

The conference from Centre were S. T. Shugert, C. T. Alexander and John P. Mitchell, from Clinton, H. L. Deffenbach, W. B. Brown and G. A. Achenbach, from Clearfield, T. J. Boyer, Walter Barrett, and A. A. Walters. The conference organized by electing H. L. Deffenbach president, and John P. Mitchell and Walter Barrett secretaries.

Centre placed in nomination J. H. Orvis, Clinton C. A. Mayor, and Clearfield G. R. Barrett. After balloting one hundred and fifty-nine (159) times, without any choice, the conference adjourned to meet at Clearfield on the 1st of September.

Clearfield, Sept. 1st.—Conference met in pursuance of adjournment. Conference from Centre, S. T. Shugert, C. T. Alexander and D. F. Fortney, from Clinton, G. O. Deise, G. A. Achenbach and W. B. Brown, from Clearfield, T. J. Boyer, G. Krutzer, J. B. Walters.

On motion of G. O. Deise, Hon. S. T. Shugert was chosen president of the conference, and D. F. Fortney and W. B. Brown, were chosen secretaries. The conference commenced balloting for Messrs. Orvis, Mayor and Barrett, after balloting five times without choice the conference took a recess of an hour and a half. Conference met at 9 o'clock, p. m., balloting six times without any choice. Adjourned to meet September 2d, at 7 o'clock, a. m.

Clearfield, Sept. 2d.—Conference met at 7 o'clock, a. m., balloting twenty-one times without any result. Adjourned till 7 o'clock, p. m.

On 7 o'clock, p. m. Conference in session, three more balloting were taken, when a resolution was offered by T. J. Boyer, to adjourn sine die, and that the conference do recommend to the University of the several counties comprising the 25th judicial district to re-assess the terms of their constituents, so that no county shall have more than one representative in the 25th judicial district.

On motion of T. J. Boyer, the resolution was laid on the table. On motion of the same gentleman, the motion to adjourn sine die was carried. On motion of D. F. Fortney, the conference adjourned to meet at Bellefonte, Sept. 3d, at 8 o'clock, p. m.

Bellefonte, Sept. 3d.—Judicial Conference met. Conference from Centre and Clinton present. Clearfield called but did not respond. G. O. Deise then placed in nomination Byron D. Hamilton of McKean county. After the 22d ballot the name of J. H. Orvis was withdrawn by C. T. Alexander, the names of Messrs. Fortney and Hamlin, were withdrawn, the conference then proceeded to the 23d ballot, which resulted as follows, viz: C. A. Mayor of Clinton five, and G. R. Barrett of Clearfield one, Messrs Shugert, Fortney, Brown, Deise and Achenbach voting for Barrett. The President declared C. A. Mayor the nominee of the conference. On motion of C. T. Alexander the nomination of Mr. Mayor was made unanimous.

The following resolutions were then offered by G. O. Deise, when the conference adjourned sine die. Resolved, That we cheerfully accept, and with pleasure endorse, the candidate nominated, and the platform adopted by the Democratic National Convention which met at New York, and we hereby pledge our active support to the former and our devotion to the principles of the latter. Resolved, That in the candidate this day nominated for Judge of the 25th Judicial District, we have full confidence in his ability, integrity and competence for that position, and we hereby pledge to him our candid and united support.
