Hope Form the Past.

Democrats be of good hope and courage. Although the October election went against your candidates, you are not wrosted and have no reason to be cast down, or to relax your energies for the coming combat. As the first intelligence of defeat flashed over the State we felt for a moment that all was lost—that our good old party had once more been crushed to earth through fraud by the corrupt giant political monopoly which has cursed the country for seven years past. Only for a moment, however, were we amazed. Later intelligence convinced us that the gallant Democracy had fought a good fight, and that they had come out of the contest dot only stronger in numbers than they were before, but that they had actually made a larger gain of votes than the Bondholders' party! For proof of this we make the following references to official figures.

In 1866 the Radicals polled for Geary 307,274 votes—the largest poll they ever made. In the same year the Democracy polled 290,096 votes for Climer—the largest poll they ever made. The total poll of votes was 597,370. These figures necessarily exhibit the greatest strength of the contending parties—the Rad in Majority 17,178 votes.

In 1867 the Radicals polled for Judge Williams only 266,824 ballots—a falling off, from their previous year's poll of 40,450 votes. In the same year the Democracy polled for Judge Sharwood only 267,746 ballots—a falling off, from their previous poll, of 22,350 votes.

The falling off of the Democratic vote being 18,109 less than the falling off in the Radical vote, left a majority of 922 for Judge Sharwood. It was, therefore the incoherence of the Radicals that enabled the Democracy in 1867 to achieve a victory. Had the poll of votes in that year been as great or greater than the poll of the previous year, instead of being (as it was,) 62,800 less, then the Democratic victory might have been esteemed a substantial one, and disgrace would have attached to our party for defeat the present falls. But, as we could not claim any gains in 1867, over 1866, we show that the Radicals had lost in any way except, as they claimed, by general apathy. We insist, to arrive at the truth, compare the contest of 1866 with that of 1867 and that of 1868.

The official returns of October's contest just rendered show that the Radicals polled 175,000 votes in 1866, 231,008 in 1867, and an increase of 56,008 on the poll of 1866. The Democracy polled for Hoyle 212,111 in 1866—an increase of 125,000 on the poll of 1865. By this it will be seen, the Democracy did not gain and we did not lose, and one vote is less than the other was, and reduced the Radical majority to 47,178 in 1867.

There is no getting over this substantial gain of the Democracy. There were 622,458 ballots polled—being 55,089 more than in 1866, and the highest poll ever reached in the State. Both parties agreed to have their full vote out and there is no doubt that the full vote and a little more was polled, because so large an increase of votes in two years is scarcely possible. But it is well known that the Bondholders' "colonized" an immense number of citizens from the Eastern States in Pennsylvania in order to swell their ranks, and we feel assured, therefore, that a large proportion of the Radical increases is bogus, whereas the Democracy's increase is legitimate and honest. The Democracy are poor; they had no money to bribe or "colonize"; had they felt so disposed, but the Bondholders, the shoddy army contractor and the officeholder who roll in wealth fished from the Government, lavishly spent their ill-gotten gains in every county, city and town throughout the State.

These facts, fellow Democrats, give us renewed hope and courage. On the 21st of November every one of the 321,891 Democrats who voted in October, will be at his post, but we are certain that from ten to fifteen thousand of the 331,068 Radicals will be wanted at their homes in New York and other States.

Be up, then Democrats, and at them again! Down with the bondholders, the plunderers, the usurpers, the tyrants, the carpet baggers, and their whole infamous structure of negro reconstruction.

Down with the destroyers of the Union the trampers up on the Constitution, the violators of the law!

Wipe out the vicious and unprincipled perpetrators of the most flagrant public and private wrongs ever known to History.

Crush the cotton thieves, and spoon thieves, and every rascal who stole books, carpet, plate, pictures, and a thousand other portable valuables, by crushing the candidates and patrons of wrong and rascality!

Go to the polls as white men, and vote as though the fate of the country and your own life, liberty and happiness depended upon your individual ballot!

Not only do this but hasten to bring out every friend; every neighbor; every acquaintance!
