ECLIPSE OF THE SUN.—We are to have two eclipses of the sun during the present year. The first will take place on the twenty third of July, but will only be partial, and invisible in this country. On August 7th a total eclipse of the sun occurs. This will be the most interesting that has been witnessed in the United States for many years, and will not happen again until the last year of the century. The shadow of the earth will commence crossing the sun's disk about half past four in the afternoon, and will not entirely pass over it until nearly half past six.

As the house-cleaning season will soon be here, we copy the following receipt for cleaning carpets: "Sprinkle the carpet with tea grounds, sweep well with a broom, then use soap and cold water to the greasy and dirty spots. This makes old carpets look new."

CURE FOR IN-GROWING NAILS.—It is stated that cauterization by hot tallow is an immediate cure for in-growing nails. Put a small piece of tallow in a spoon, and heat it over a lamp until it becomes very hot, and drop two or

three drops between the nail and granulations. The effect is almost magical. Pain and tenderness are at once relieved, and in a few days the granulation is leaving the diseased parts dry, and destitute of feeling, and the edge of the nail exposed, so as to admit of being pared away without any inconvenience. The operation causes little or no pain, if the tallow is properly heated.
