Some of the more important items indicative of the progress of our schools will be noticed in the following report, SCHOOL HOUSES. - Thirty five school houses have been built during the last three years, at a cost of some nity thousand dollars, (\$50,000.) Elev-en of these were built during the last Year: Bellefonte, one, Benner, one, Curtin, one, Gregg, one, Halfmoon, one; Harris, one; Liberty, one; Potter, one; Rush, one; Taylor, one, and Walker, one. These are all good hous cs, and well arranged. The one in Liberty in a large frame building, with three commodious mones, built in accordance with the suggestion in last ear's report, and does honor to the en terprising spirit of the directors. The new building at Bellefonte is constructed of stone, is 74 feet long by 22 wide. The first sloor has four rooms, each and olosets live by six feet each; also, a teachers' room, and a directors' room, each nineteen by fourteen feet. On the room. The class rooms are separated by glass partitions, thus giving the
