These efforts, projudicial alike to the interests of the Western and Middle States, have bith erto been successful in securing for Ne's England manufacturers the object sought to be attained. But the irksome and sumptuary duties on iron, glass si'ks, drugs and other prime necessa ries have had the effect of preparing the mind of the country for the coming change -while the zealous propaga tion of New England Radicalism, in al its varied 1-ms and ologies, is hasten ing that period when the East will be dive-ted of its long-sustained and preponderating influence in the affairs of the Union.

That the political power of the East should be superceded by that of the Middle and Western States, & not only a natural sequence. It is a national necessity-the result of that sequence.
