

without amendment. The terms on which at length Virginia is to be admitted were yesterday set forth in our columns, and may be found again to-day embodied in the reports of the proceedings. We do not need to repeat that we deeply regret the result finally attained at the end of these weary weeks of debate and recrimination. Congress prescribed certain terms for the admission of Virginia; the State complied to the full with those terms; Congress now prescribes fresh terms! This is punishing the treason of Virginia in 1861 by bad faith on the part of Congress in 1870. We do not believe such a course to be statesmanlike or even sound party policy; and aggravating as is the wrong done Virginia, we believe she will suffer less from it in the end than will the party that has wrought it.

The Altoona Tribune gives an account of a couple of young gentlemen who didn't feel much like giving any account of themselves, after the occurrence related below. The Tribune says:
