THE PENNSYLVANIA R. R. ACTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS - ROAD TO BE PUT UNDER CONTRACT AT ONCE. At the meeting of the Board of Directors of the P. C. & S. C. railroad, held in Philadelphia, on the 15th inst. the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

At the meeting held at Centre Mall on the 10th inst., the President of the road stated in his speech that the engineers had at that time finished their surveys to Millburg, that their estimates were almost completed, that sufficient stock had already been subscribed, the right of way promised, and that all that was needed was the finishing of the Engineers' estimates and requiring the agreements guaranteeing the right of way to be ready to place the road under contract.

Why the road is to be put under contract at present, only to the summit of miles west of Millburg, we know not, but one thing is certain, when it gets that far there will be no stopping it until it ends at Spruce Creek or Tyrone.
