

### HOW THE MONEY GOES!

**Something for Tax-payers to Consider.**

\$29,000,000 STOLEN—\$20,000,000 UNACCOUNTED FOR—\$800,000,000 "GONE WILKIE THE WOODBINE TWINING."

\$1,000,000 of the people's money stolen from the steamer Golden Rule \$2,235,000 missing while Secretary Boutwell was Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

\$3,000,000 missing through U. S. Treasurer Spinner. \$19,000,000 missing in the Post Office Department.

\$6,000,000 missing on account of sale of arms, vessels and munitions of war. \$1,000,000 missing on account of sale of iron-clads to Peru.

\$20,000,000 missing on account of collectors of Internal Revenue. During the past two years the receipts from customs, internal revenue and other sources aggregated \$800,000,000. Of this sum about \$200,000,000 has been appropriated to the payment of the national debt, while the "expenses of the government" were estimated at \$800,000,000—leaving a balance of \$600,000,000 unaccounted for.

Is it any wonder that Republican office holders can afford to keep expensive carriages, dozens of expensive horses, liveried servants, and houses worth hundreds of thousands of dollars? Is it any wonder that all the leading men of the Republican party are living in a style far beyond their income from their salaries, and yet making money? Is it any wonder that millionaires in civil life become bankrupt in endeavoring to live in the same style as government officials who are supposed to receive salaries of \$8,000 to \$25,000 a year?

Is it any wonder that Republican "State Agents" who have failed in gift enterprises, can amass \$200,000 to \$300,000 in four years in "doing business for the State," or that Republican State officers are afraid to prosecute such Agents for embezzlement?

### The Cholera.

According to Dr. John C. Peters, in the New York Medical Journal, every outbreak of the Asiatic cholera beyond the confines of British India may be traced back to Hindostan, through a continuous chain of human beings affected with the disease, or through water contaminated or articles stained with their dejects. This article shows how festivals and pilgrimages serve as the distributors of this fearful contagion, catching it up from its original seat scattering abroad over the world. But what most impresses a western reader of these descriptions of Eastern life is the absolute defiance of all sanitary laws and hygienic condition of the people of those crowded regions. In the villages the huts are huddled together in masses, and pushed up to the very edge of the ponds or tanks, their projecting eaves often meet, while the intervening spaces, impervious to the rays of the sun, are converted to the most unclean purposes, and used by both sexes in common. The ponds of liquid filth, often covering 150,000 square feet, by actual measurement, are found in some of these villages. Moreover we are told that there is no such thing as a pump in all India, and all their drinking water is drawn from the large ponds, or pools, or tanks, or from open wells and is always carried about in leather bags, made of sheep skin, which can never be properly cleaned, and are often in use for several years. And this filthy liquid is used by the natives to dilute the milk which is sold for the public consumption. Doubtless there are people in America who will be shocked at our want of faith when we say that what those regions want most and first is not to be Bibled but to be drained, and that until the gospel of cleanliness can be put into practice by the people, the gospel of Christianity will be an incomprehensible and useless mystery to them. A good board of health would do more in the villages and cities of India than all the missionaries that can be sent there.
