Farmer Gormley denied the claim of own-ership with emphasis and disdain. Then Farmer McCaughn summoned his chicken raising neighbor before the Court for trial, and issue was joined. The question was not between hen and but between farmer and farmer, or, rather, it was the mother and the chickens. Now ordinary common sense would suggest that as the hatching of chickens is a mere mechanical process chiefly dependent upon caloric, as science has demonstrated most thoroughly, it is not characteristic, or necessarily even suggestive, of motherhood. The sitting-hen is unquestionably an efficient incubator, and so, too, would be a rooster, if you could get him to sit long enough ; but who would presume to say that a rooster becomes a mother should he hatch a dozen broods ? Justice Mc-Mahon has decided that Farmer Gormley must surrender the two chickens to Farmer McCaughn, or pay to him the full amount of their value. But is not Farmer Gormley entitled to pay for the labor and use of his hen in hatching the eggs? The tension of Justice is righteous to the main issue, but he seems to have overlooked the fundamental propriety of a counter claim. We advise Farmer Gromley to appeal.

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
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
