Washington, Nov. 10 - The demand for the issuance of small treasury notes is being rapidiy met by the bureau of printing and engraving. When the the silver bill first, went into effect the notes issued under that law were all large denomination, and the business world was suffering from the deficit in the birls of smaller denominations. Captain Meridith, the chief of the bureau, said to-day his department was very rapidly pre paring these bills for circulation. Onedollar notes are being issued at the rate of 40,000 per day. The plates for the two-dollar notes are not yet completed. nd they will not be ready for a week or 10 days.
