UNCLE SAM'S BIG FARM.—The greatest breadth of the United States, from Point Isabel, Texas, to the northern boundary near Pembina, North Dakota, is 1,611 1/2 miles; its greatest length from the Atlantic to the Pacific on the parallel of forty-two degrees, is 2,768 miles. It will be seen from these figures that the United States is larger from ocean to ocean than it is from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico. The total area, including Alaska, is 3,602,000 square miles; that of British North America, so-called, which includes the present Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland, is 3,510,592 square miles. The whole area of the United States and territories, including water surface of lakes and territories, is nearly equal to 4,000,000 square miles. British North America is larger than the United States without Alaska. Alaska has an area of 577,399 square miles.
