Quite a revolution was effected by the system of growing potatoes by the trench method, for when experiments showed that a grower could produce over 128 bushels of potatoes on oneeighth of an acre, or at the rate of more than 1000 bushels on an acre, as was done by Mr. A. Rose, of Pen Yan, N. Y, the new system at once attracted attention, for Mr. Rose also secured over 500 bushels of potatoes on a full "roses to the cheek," and the "rainbows measured acre of ground.
