Predicts a Great Change.

Hon. Tom L. Johnson Thinks Politicians Will Change Parties. The New York Herald had an interview with Congressman Tom Johnson and points six pictures of him, with a picturesque story. The tariff bill was the chief subject. Mr. Johnson discussed in his office at 84 Nassau street. He had come from Washington to see Mr. Muxham, his managing partner, who had left Johnstown to meet him.

"What do you think of the senate revision of the Wilson bill?" "The house made an effort to carry out a policy of tariff reform, and the result was the Wilson bill," said Mr. Johnson. "It wasn't what the people demanded. It was only a little less of McKinleyism than the McKinley bill, but it did provide for a reduction of tariff and did have a theory of free raw material. It was bad enough, but the best we could get, whereas the bill as revised by the senate is worse. It knocks out the free list almost completely, and has been revised for the benefit of certain interests. That is the distinguishing feature of the senate's attitude in the matter. It is trying to legislate for the benefit of trusts, while the house endeavored to consider the masses."

"What do you think of the Democratic party to-day?" "There is no doubt there has been great disintegration during the past year. It is to be found in all parts of the country. It is difficult to the end, and the probable result will be that the protectionist or conservative Democrat will have to get out and join the Republican party, while the free trade Republicans will come over to us. I expect to see a grand system of exchanges inaugurated. Then there won't be any more sailing under false colors. The line will be sharply drawn and each party will not be hampered as it is now by the presence of men who do not believe in the party's principles and are merely in the party as a result of political training and association.

In reference to the probable action of the senate on the tariff bill as revised by the senate, Mr. Johnson said: "The senate has put in some things which the house will never consent. I look for the biggest fight on the senate's proposition to tax coal and sugar. The tax on sugar is infamous." Asked what he thought of the first year of Cleveland's administration he looked dubious and finally said: "I'm not a sore-head, and I don't say to you what I haven't said or wouldn't say to Mr. Cleveland himself; and then you must remember that he has had these frightfully hard times to contend against. But he has made one big mistake. It was his failure to act promptly in the tariff matter. In my opinion he should have called congress together as soon as he was inaugurated. Had that been done the tariff would have been out of the way and we would not now be in a state of uncertainty because the bill is hanging fire."

"What do you think of the income tax?" "It is a very bad form of taxation. I am against it. I believe it is inequitable and monarchial. But it is better than a tax on sugar, for instance."

Silvery Elm.

Gathering the Crop Now in New Jersey and New York. The gathering of the slippery elm crop of the New York and New Jersey dairy farms begins early in February and continues until well along in May. The work is at its greatest activity during March and April.

It may surprise a great many people to know that much of the canned chicken they buy and not a small portion of the chicken salad they order at restaurants or take advantage of as free lunch are canned chicken and chicken salad only by commercial courtesy. They are in reality simply the compounded results of the slippery elm product of the dairy farms. This is not the slippery elm of grateful poultry fame and of far reaching popularity of the glib "cud" of the rural small boy.

This slippery elm does not belong to the vegetable world. It is of the animal kingdom—a member of the animal kingdom as callow as callow can be and more slippery than an oyster. It is calves—calves so young that they have scarcely had time yet to become frightened at the first sound of their voices. Slippery elm is the pleasing and suggestive term by which these calves are known technically among the producers and harvesters of the crop. They are more widely known, perhaps, as bob veal.

New Use for the Telephone.

Here's a story of the telephone as it is used, or abused, in Russia. The use of the instrument to intiment prisoners as the invention of a police inspector at Odessa. A man was one day brought into a serious robbery. The inspector had some difficulty in proving the case, and had recourse to an ingenious stratagem. He went to the telephone in an adjoining room, and asked the clerk at the central office to speak into the instrument the following words, in a solemn tone, "Istno Smelanski, you must confess the robbery; if you don't you are sure to be sentenced, and your punishment will be all the more severe."

He then sent for the prisoner and questioned him again, threatening to appeal to the "machine" to get at the truth. The thief burst into a laugh, but the inspector held the telephone to his ear, and gave the preconcerted signal. The result was as expected. The rogue, terrified by the warning uttered by the uncanny "machine," at once made a clean breast of it.
