The Excuse Accusative.

The average criminal arraigned for any of the minor crimes always thinks, and frequently declares, that he is no worse than the majority of men. A man of this sort was called up for sentence for larceny a few years ago in a county of Indiana, if memory serves.

"What have you to say why sentence should not be pronounced?" asked the judge. "Only this, your honor," said the convict, "that if I am a thief, all men are thieves and if I am to be punished, all men should be punished."

By some mode of reasoning, or because he could not reason, that man justified his act by accusing all mankind. More intelligent persons, and persons of whom better things are expected, justify themselves to themselves, or are by their friends justified in the plea, "They all do it."

This plea is no plea at all, because all men are not thieves, or swindlers, or liars, or licentious. On the contrary, the vast majority of civilized men are neither, but men whose lives, though not perfect, are nevertheless wholly decent and above board. It is a shock to the sensibilities to read in the public prints in connection with the trial now going on in Washington, that the distinguished defendant is no worse than most public men, and in fact that the offense for which he is on trial is not only not exceptional, but the rule.

We are gravely told by one correspondent that a considerable party hold to this plea in excuse. Such an excuse is so sweeping, and goes so far as to expunge the foundations of public morals, that not to protest is to assent. This paper cannot assent to any sweeping accusation like that. The vast majority of men are not guilty as this defendant is charged, which charge has yet to be proven. That anybody at this stage of the evidence should come forth as the defendant's friend, and practically admit the charge to be true by excusing it, is most surprising. If, after a verdict rendered, the public think the charge is proved, that will be ample time to put in the plea of confession and avoidance. To put in such a plea now is most damaging to the defendant, whose witnesses have not been heard.

But the plea is vicious in the extreme. The upholders of an action cannot be changed by alleging that ten or ten thousands persons indulge in such acts. Whatever is wrong is wrong because it degrades human nature and offends against the moral law whether it is practiced by one or a thousand. The fact that we have statutes prohibiting certain acts under penalty is positive proof that a majority of citizens do not indulge in such acts. For in this country the measure of the laws, and the laws of a country, is ordained by the suffrage of the people, pretty fairly gauge the moral status of the mass. To deny this is to say that free government is a delusion. The penalties affixed to certain acts generally furnish the measure of moral consciousness. Men may enact penal laws, no doubt, without much reference to the turpitude of the acts prescribed. They may do it in self-defense, or because they are in fear of consequences and would deter the vicious from the commission of such offenses. But at last the penal clause becomes adjusted to the magnitude of the offense, and thus the penalties themselves become a fair measure of moral consciousness.

There is much to be said as respects erotic offenses that will not be tolerated as respects various offenses perhaps not nearly so menacing to society. The tendency is to excuse in the first instance and to condemn unqualifiedly in the second. But while this is true, it is no excuse to say that an offender is no worse than most men. That cannot be the question so long as the conduct excused is condemned in law and morals.
