The Tramp Crusade

The Coxey army of tramps and innocents is mainly materializing in the shape of penniless persons who, seeking a chance to indulge in undisturbed plunder of the country along the line, are flocking by twos and threes to the point of assemblage by the freight truck and bumper sleepers. The probable dimensions of the whole product of irrational brains are that Massillon and the country around will be overrun with tramps until the authorities of that district pluck up spunk enough to take some vigorous action under the vagrant acts.

In the meantime some characteristic incidents are illustrating the nature of the people whom the scheme attracts. One man has arrived to reinforce the "army" with the announcement that he refused a job at \$110 a month in order to demonstrate in his own reason the soundness of the unemployed. The Pacific coast wing of the army coolly calls upon either a city or a railroad corporation to furnish it with free transportation for its joint across the continent. The second in command of the scheme has been charged by a labor organ with having been an employe of Leland Stanford to discredit work in the interest of the Central and Southern Pacific corporations, and hotly refuses to deny or plead guilty to the charge. All of it is the most grotesque burlesque on the ideas and methods of American democracy that has ever been known in this country. It is built on the model of Lord George Gordon's "No Popery" riots, with the additional feature that it is perpetrated in the face of the supposed progress and enlightenment of another century.

That century old outbreak of adulated malcontents, cranks and criminals illustrates the ability of unsettled brains to start a project which the lawless can use for plunder. It is possible that a man can be so devoid of judgment as to summon men to a scheme which can only be carried out by wholesale plunder, and to rely on his declaration that everything must be done according to law. But a man in the full possession of reason who promotes such a scheme is joining an expedition for freebooting or worse. Every old soldier knows that a disciplined army of 5,000, and much less ten times that number, cannot be marched fifty miles through a rural district without plunder. When an army of individuals in numbers is well out on authority and discipline to restrain it, and without means to feed and shelter it, the proposition, it carried out, necessarily implies that along its line of march will be left a wake of plundered homes.

It is humiliating that this product of irresponsibility and ignorance must be treated seriously. But, since it has attained to such proportions, the authorities everywhere should be prepared to promptly suppress the least breach of the peace. The Governors of Ohio, Pennsylvania and Maryland should see to it that the first act of plunder is punished and the first riotous proceeding suppressed. If this is done properly the whole army will be quickly placed in confinement—the lunatics in asylums and the tramps in workhouses and jails. -Pittsburg Dispatch

Five Baby Lions

The Mother, Sultan, Killed Two of Them Trying to Strike the Keeper.

BROOKLYN, March 23.—There was a large addition to the Noah's Ark trained animal exhibition to-day. Keeper Ferari on his first daily round among the animals found that the lioness had given birth to five seven pound lion cubs. There are usually only four to two to four in a litter of lion cubs. Ferari got a pan of milk and offered it to Sultan. She struck out at him with out-tretched claws. She thought, perhaps, Ferari would take away the cubs. The blow missed the keeper, but struck two of the cubs and killed them. Sultan is now shut up in a dark cage. She is an African lioness, seven years old. She is a savage beast. Eight months ago she gave birth to quadruplets. Nero, her mate, is a black maned African lion. He is six years older than his spouse.

The Democratic Party's Real Danger.

What is the fundamental doctrine of the protectionists? That the State, by constant interference in the way of tariff laws, shall make certain industries profitable. What is the doctrine of the tariff reformers? That the State shall leave these things to the independent, self-reliant activities of the people. From whom, then, have the Populists and the Socialists learned their "wild theories"? From protectionist doctrines, and not from those of the tariff reformers. The real danger at present lies not in the Democratic policy in this respect, but in the uncertainty whether the Democrats in Congress will carry that policy into effect.

A Great Flood.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., March 21.—The greatest flood in the history of south central Arkansas is now on and that part of the state is rapidly approaching the condition of an inland ocean. It has rained almost incessantly all over the state and in the Indian territory for four days.

Railway communication since Monday has been almost entirely cut off from the south to Texas, and from recent reports it is not improbable that the same fate awaits the country on the north and west, and probably the east.

The Coffee Was Forthcoming.

—For some time past the world's Woman's Christian Temperance Union has been preparing for presentation to the different governments a monster petition against the liquor and opium traffic and against legalized vice. It has grown until it bears now over 2,000,000 individual signatures and with the attestation of certain societies not less than 3,000,000.

In order to present this an international demonstration is to be organized, a first class steamer is to be chartered and a party of 100 persons, it is said, will accompany Lady Henry Somerset and Miss Willard in the presentation. The plan is to begin with the United States Government next October. They will then go to Great Britain, having a grand demonstration at Exeter Hill, London, on November 1. Italy will be the next point, where it is hoped that both the Pope and the King of Italy will receive the delegation. Greece, Jerusalem and Cairo will then be visited. It is intended to reach India in time for the National Congress, and great meetings will be held in all the principalities. From Calcutta they will go to Ceylon, Australia, China, Japan, etc.
