British Cotton Trade. The Returns Show that Spinners Are Doing a Big Business.

The monthly returns of the exports of cotton goods from the United Kingdom were posted on the New York Cotton Exchange, and they show that the English spinners are doing a phe-nomenal business. Shipments of yarns in January were 23,000,000 pounds, against 20,000,000 pounds in December and 18,310,000 pounds in January last year. The exports of cloths for January, 1895, were 465,-000,000 yards, against 434,000,000 in December and 461,951,000 in January last year. The shippings of yarn were thirty per cent. larger than a year ago and of cloths one per cent. larger. This shows a condition of trade better
