Ready to hand and to be had for the taking, from the peaceful inhabitants, were such treasure and wealth as the world had

never before dreamed of. Simultaneously with these cruelties abroad came the inquisition at home and the persecution of the Jews. Whoever reads of them will find that the present generation of Spaniards come by their cruel instincts honestly.
