EDITOR WATCHMAN.—After a pleasant winter spent in Centre and Clinton counties, the latter part of March found me on my way home to North Dakota.

I took the regular forenoon train on the B. E. V. road to Tyrone, where, after a wait of one hour, I boarded the Great Northern excursion train, and found it occupied by as jolly a party of Pennsylvanians as ever left the good old State, to make new homes in the great Northwest.

I found the party in charge of immigration agent A. J. Wittaker, of Litchfield, Minn., as pleasant and obliging a gentleman as ever trod in shoe leather.

The party was mostly made up of people from Port Royal, Lewistown, Mifflin and several other towns in the centre of the State. Yosts, Shabs, Kneps and other familiar names were in the party.

There was one young man from Port Royal, called "Charlie" by every one, whose surname, I am sorry to say I have forgotten. He was a good singer, an indefatigable joker and the pleasant, good natured life of the party.

After some hours rest in Saint Paul we again started westward and the last stage of our journey was begun. Thirty passenger coaches, in two sections, made up our train, followed by long freight trains loaded with the stock, machinery, and household goods of the emigrants. Across Minnesota; over the Red River of the North, and into the long-ford land, North Dakota. Past Grand Forks, with its factories, mills, and elevators; Larimore with its splendid homes; Lakota, Bartlett, then hurrah for Devils Lake and home.
