FARM NOTES.

Bisulphide of carbon is used for destroying weevil in wheat bins. Force a tube to the bottom of the bin.

Early in spring the wheat may be harvested with a smoothing harrow and 100 pounds of nitrate of soda per acre applied.

When a plant is consumed it is reduced to a very small bulk, which is termed ashes. A large proportion of the plant goes into the air, consisting of water carbon and nitrogen.

Red clover is valuable for the abundance of pasture it produces and for its excellence as food. Rich in lime and nitrogen, as well as containing a large proportion of starchy matter, it is one of the balanced foods used.

The two largest breeds of geese are the Embden and Toulouse. The Embden is white—both gander and female—and the birds are quiet in disposition.

No animal can use its food twice. If a cow converts her provender into milk she can not also make it into good beef.

As spring approaches vermin seem increasingly troublesome. Nothing is so universally annoying on hogs as the common gray louse.

When wood ashes is applied lime is unnecessary, as every 100 pounds of wood ashes contains 40 pounds of lime.

All the manure that is being leached every time it rains or the snow melts is greatly deteriorating, until by spring, when it is to be hauled out and spread, it will have about half or two-thirds its proper value as a fertilizer.

It is much easier to destroy birds than insects, but as the number of birds is reduced the insects multiply. The wren is a very useful bird and may be induced to remain near dwelling houses if boxes are provided.

While the udder of the cow should be washed at every milking to insure perfect cleanliness of the milk yet the cow should be kept where she will be clean.

Strawberries can be grown at a small cost compared with the prices received, but the better the cultivation and the more liberal the use of the fertilizer the lower the expense, as the crop yield will be so much greater.
