Case of Burial Alive. Suspicions of Mrs. Needham's Horrible Fate Verified

After Twenty-one Years. The discovery that Mrs. Needham, wife of a farmer, near Roann, Ind., was buried

alive twenty years ago has caused a sensation of horror in that neighborhood. The young woman died supposedly when her first child was born in 1880. When the casket was exhumed the persons present at the opening of the coffin were astounded to find the glass top broken, the left arm, which, with the right had been laid upon the breast at the time had been laid upon the breast at the time of the burial, lying beside the trunk, while the right was uplifted, with the hands clinched beneath the head, the hair evi-dently having been clutched violently in the agony of the moment. The body it-self, which had been laid upon the back, was partially turned over, and the sur-roundings were indicative of a terrible

Big Engine is Speedy.

Special Train of Colorado Excursionists Tests New

Railway men of all classes are watching with much interest the tests of the "1200 series" of engines of the Rock Island road, the largest running out of Chicago in passenger service. Engine No. 1201 was given its first severe test for power and speed last week. The patrons of the Rock Island's first excursion of Colorado occupied four-teen of the largest and heaviest coaches. This was enough for two trains to be pulled by ordinary passenger engines of the day, considering the speed required. The big engine did all that was expected of it and more. Between Chicago and Rock Island it pulled that train of fourteen coaches with ease on schedule time, and when called on for a little extra effort

developed a speed of over 72 miles an hour.
