Project on Foot to Reclaim 500,000 Acres of Desert

To aid in building the largest reservoir in the world, and to provide for the irrigation of more than 500,000 acres of land, most of which is now given over to desert besides 100,000 acres of laud on the Pima Indian reservation, Arizona is asking Con-

gress to appropriate \$1,000,000.

A petition has been forwarded to Washington asking for the passage of an act enabling Maricopa county, Arizona, to issue bonds to the amount of \$2,500,000, a sum believed to be sufficient to provide for the project under contemplation

The site proposed for the great dam is on the Salt River, in the mountains, about sixtymiles north east of Phænix, at the point where the river, leaving the Tonto basin, enters a deep gorge in the solid rock. The gorge is but 200 feet wide at the level of the stream, and for the first hundred feet upward the walls are perpendicular. In the preliminary reconnoisance bedrock was located at an average depth of twenty-five feet below the stream bed. It is proposed to build a masonry dam which will be 200 feet high above low water, and allowing for wasteways twenty feet deep, will create a reservoir 180 feet deep. The dam will be 650 feet long on top. The wasteways on each side of the dam are calculated to pass, without overtopping the dam, the greatest known flood, that of 1891, when the discharge during part of one day was equal to one-half of that running over

Niagara Falls. The reservoir site, covering more than twenty square miles, is likewise ideally located by nature.
