Heavy Loss for Japanese Army. Defeated at Three Places in Attempts to Land Troops Near Port Archur. Over 400 Men Were London, Feb. 15.-The Daily Mail's

Port Arthur correspondent, under date of February 12, says:

"Official advices state that the Japanese landed 600 soldiers near Talien-Wan with disastrous results, 410 of them being sabred by Cossacks. The remainder escaped to their ships. It is further stated that the Japanese landed at Dove Bay, where 30 of them were killed and the remainder retreated."

The Daily Mail's New Chwang cor-

respondent cables: "According to official Port Arthur telegrams, the Japanese landed a force at Pigeon Bay, West Port Arthur. They were then attacked by troops and by the batteries and were defeated with heavy loss."

The correspondent of the Daily Express at Pekin, in a cablegram dated February 12, reports that Viceroy Alexieff is practically isolated, direct communication between Port Arthur and Vladivostock being suspended. He adds that the railroad behind Port Arthur has been blown up and that 6000 Japanese troops have landed near Dalny.

The Daily Mail's Tokio correspondent, under date of February 12, says that the Japanese warship Amaki has captured the German steamer Yokohama, which had a cargo, including dynamite, for Port Arthur.

The Daily Telegraph's Shanghai correspondent, under date of February 12, says it is reported that the Japanese have bombarded Dalny and landed marines. Their Nagasaki correspondent expresses the conviction that Russia is quite unable to hold the Liao-Tung peninsula, and that Port Arthur is bound to fall by the effluxion of time, even without an assault.

The Tokio correspondent of the Times, cabling under date of February 12, says: "It is said that the Japanese squadron has sealed Port Arthur."

The Times' Wei-Hai-Wei correspondent says that on the morning of February 10 the Japanese occupied Ching-Haia-Wen, a Russian coaling station close to Masampho.

JAPS CAPTURED SIX VESSELS Steamers When Seized Were Carrying Coal For Russia.

Nagasaki, Feb. 15.—Six Norwegian steamers chartered by a Russian naval contractor have been captured. The vessels are the Lena, Activ, Sentis, Seirstadt, Argo and Hermis. They carried coal cargoes. The Hermis arrived here under convoy of a cruiser. It is rumored that 1800 Japanese soldiers have been killed, presumably by the sinking of a transport. Disturbances are reported proceeding ir

A dispatch from Chemulpo gives the following account of the destruction Philipsburg. of the Russian cruiser Variag and the gunboat Korietz. The Japanese fleet, Ellen Koons, of Centre Hall. commanded by Admiral Uriu, on the flagship Adneuma, arrived at noon and sent a wireless telegram to the Japanese cruiser Chigoda, which was lying at anchor between the Variag and Korietz, to join the fleet outside. The Russians found themselves trapped. Admiral Uriu then signalled, giving the Russians five minutes in which to surrender. The Russians ignored the demand to surrender, and the Japanese then opened fire. A brisk engagement lasting two hours followed. The Russian vessels, getting the worst of an encounter in which the odds were overwhelmingly against them, steamed back into the harbor. The Variag, which was badly injured, listed heavily. Two hours later the Russians attempted to break through the Japanese fleet, which was encountered four miles from the inner harbor. A fierce fight followed. The Russian vessels were badly damaged. The Korietz was blown up, presumably by its own crew, in order to escape capture. A portion of the crew was rescued by the French and Italian vessels in the harbor. The Variag tried to escape, but suddenly an explosion was heard, and the Variag was seen to sink. Whether she was sunk by a Japanese shell or by her own crew is not known. The United States gunboat Vicksburg and the British cruiser Talbot witnessed the battle.

The positions of the wrecks appear to be such that it will be easy to recover the guns. The Russian losses were one officer and 40 men killed and 464 wounded.

Will Command Russian Army. St. Petersburg, Feb. 15.—A telegram from Khakarovsk says that General Litevitch has been appointed to the supreme command of the Russian army in Manchuria. Grand Duke Cyril, a cousin of the czar, and Grand Duke Boris, the czar's uncle, are about to proceed to the seat of war.

A comminication from Viceroy Alexieff just received confirms the report of the landing of 19,000 Japanese troops at Chemulpo. The viceroy adds along the Chinese eastern railway and also to destroy one of the abutments of the Sungari bridge. These at tempts, he adds, were immediately detected and decisive measures taken to guard the railway.

Japan Will Refuse American Aid. Tokio, Feb. 16. Goro Takahira, the Japanese minister at Washington, has officially advised the government that he is receiving numerous offers of large contributions to the war fund from Americans, and requests instructions as to the policy of the government in them. Powell was arrested by State Detectives Rat lidge and Francis, charged with the murder of Estella Allaband, her 21 year-old adopted daughter, whose ter ribly mutilated body was found last Tuesday in the attic of the Powell farm house, near Magnolia, 10 miles from here. The accused woman was placed in the Dover jail, and will be given a hearing tomorrow. The ar rest of Mrs. Powell is the result of an investigation carried on by the state authorities, who were not satisfied with the verdict of suicide rendered by a coroner's jury.

Mrs. Powell was taken into custody after the funeral of the girl, which she attended. She took her arrest coolly and did not seem surprised. As she left the house she said to one of the farm hands: "Good-bye, Peter; 1 am going. I may come back and I may not."

The detectives say they have secured a statement from Edgar Cooper, the 5-year-old adopted son of the Powells, who was alone in the house with Mrs. Powell on the day the girl is alleged to have been killed. According to the detectives, the boy said that Estella had been struck by "Aunt Molly" (Mrs. Powell) with a piece of wood while she was washing in the outshed, and that Estella ran into the kitchen, where she was again attacked.

The Powell house, in which are Mr. Powell and three farm hands, is still under surveillance.

Two Killed By Runaway Trolley. Cumberland, Md., Feb. 15. — Two persons were killed and about 75 injured, 25 of whom were seriously hurt, in a trolley car accident in Frostburg. The car ran away on a steep grade on Grant street, and upon reaching a sharp curve jumped the track and crashed into a telegraph pole. The car was smashed to splinters and scarcely one of the 80 passengers escaped injury of some sort. The dead are: John Gough, of Midland; J. J. Rose, of Lenaconing.

Susquehanna Falls Eight Feet. Wilkesbarre, Pa., Feb. 15.-The water in the Susquehanna river has fallen eight feet since last Tuesday, and the river is blocked with ice as far up the stream as Tunkhannock, a distance of 35 miles. It is free of ice from there as far as Oswego, N. Y., where there is another jam. The water here is 17.7 above low water mark.

BATTLE WITH BURGLARS.—The postoffice at Cresson was broken into at an early hour Saturday morning by a gang of five burglars, who blew open the safe and in a battle with a number of citizens, who were attracted by the explosion, about fifty shots werefired and one of the burglars was wounded. An alley three feet wide separated the postoffice from the Anderson house. The burglars gained an entrance to the office by removing a pane of glass from one of the front windows. Once inside, they unlocked the front door. Three men went inside to do the job, while two remained outside to guard against surprises.

Gail Nolan, clerk at the Anderson house, who had been out to a party, came home while the burglars were at work. He saw the two silent guards, who apparently were carrying on a conversation in front of the postoffice. Without suspicion he passed into the Anderson bouse. Landlord C. Wenderoth had not yet retired for the night, when Nolan arrived at the hotel. While they were together a terrific explosion occurred in the postoffice building. They at once concluded that safe-crackers

were at work. A number of guests were aroused, and, headed by the landlord, went forth to investigate. The burglars crawled out of a window in the alleyway between the two buildings, where they were held at bay for a short time, and a fusilade of shots were that reports have been received of exchanged. Several of the citizens' posse attempts to cut the telegraph wires at the rear of the alley left their posts, thinking the burglars were getting away with the party in front, and the burglars succeeded in making their escape by the

rear way. They were tracked by a trail of blood to the railroad, thus indicating that at least one was hit. It was found that they had boarded an east-bound freight train, which was passing, and the chase was given up. None of the citizens' posse was hurt.
When the men left Cresson on the freight,
the operator at Gallitzin was notified by
