14,000 Russians go to Wafangtien. Kuropatkin Says Quiet Prevails Near Feng Wang Cheng-No Change in New Chwang.

The Daily Mail's New Chwang corre-spondent, cabling under date of June 2nd, says : "General Stalkenberg, with 14,000 Russians, made up of artillery, cavalry and infantry, has marched south of Liao Yang in the direction of Washington. Large forces of Chinese bandits are collecting in the hills northeast of the Liao river and are preparing to cut the railway north of Muk-

The correspondent of the Daily Express at Nagasaki cables that transports loaded with troops continue to leave western Japanese ports daily for the theater of war. large proportion of those dispatched during the past week, he says, were to reinforce General Oku.

VLADIVOSTOK, June 2.—Letters from the theater of war report that Russian raiders have succeeded in penetrating as far as Gensan, and also south of Anju. They have destroyed depots of Japanese supplies and captured provision trains. Koreans are fleeing into Manchuria to escape the hardships of war. Chinese are moving from Kwan Tung into Northern Manchuria in order to avoid living in territory under Japanese control.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 2.- The following telegram from General Kuropatkin to the Emperor, dated June 1st, has been received: "Quiet prevails in the direction of Feng Wang Cheng. The town of Saimatsza, which was evacuated by the Japanese May 31st, has been re-occupied by our troops. "Our patrols May 31st had a skirmish in ron of cavalry. We had one Cossack wounded. There is no change in the situa-tion at New Chwang or Kai Chou."

Plague of Locusts.

Great swarms of locusts have most destroyed all the young cotton and other crops in Egypt this year, and the situation is so serious that the government has called out the Coryce to organize for the destruction of the pest, if necessary by forced labor. The locusts are descending upon the country in solid masses, two or three feet deep and several miles long, and they do not leave a green leaf wherever they have gone Thousands of people all over the coun-

try are busy digging trenches, which are filled with straw and put afire at the first sign of the approaching insects. In the neighborhood of Cairo the fields for miles around are covered with the

bodies of the destroyed locusts, and these are beginning to decay, endangering the health of the population, but it is impossible to get them out of the way, at least until the swarms have ceased to come.
