State street gives only a partial view of the white house of government and how far from satisfying it is can be gathered from one of the accompanying pictures. This is the only place from which the capitol can be seen on the east side.

The advantages of extension of the view point are obvious to anyone. When it is remembered that in beauty of outline, decoration and material this capitol will rank almost alone in the country the effect of leaving it who take a pride in the state and would have it rank first in all things.
