

FIEND SHOT TO DEATH

Man Assaulted 12-Year-Old Daughter and is Killed By Wife.

Cumberland, Md., April 30.—George Fogel, of Brooklyn Heights, Md., a little hamlet across the river from Henriks, Md., returned to his home after he had been drinking, and entering the room where his wife and 12-year-old daughter were in bed, drew a revolver and announced that he would shoot upon being interfered with. Fogel then threw his wife to the floor and assaulted his daughter. Mrs. Fogel secured the revolver and fired five shots at her husband, killing him instantly. She surrendered to the authorities, but was not locked up. It was announced that the woman will not be prosecuted.

MANY PULAJANES KILLED

Moros and Troops Defeat Them in Battles.

Manila, May 1.—A detail of Moros on the island of Samar, in an encounter with Pulajanes killed 30 of the latter.

Detachments of federal troops while scouting in the Garidara valley, on the island of Samar, encountered several bands of Pulajanes. In the engagements that followed many Pulajanes were killed and their supplies destroyed. There were no casualties among the troops.

Troops Guard Negro.

Richmond, Va., May 1.—On account of threats to lynch Gabriel Battelle, a negro, who criminally assaulted Miss Lena Rogers, daughter of Rudolph Rogers, of King George Court House, the militia company commanded by Captain Rowe, at Fredericksburg, arrived here and guarded the jail. Excitement in the community is intense. It is threatened that an attempt will be made to storm the jail and lynch the prisoner. It is probable that Captain Rowe will endeavor to spirit Battelle to the Fredericksburg jail for safe keeping.
