Everybody probably feels that his or her mental condition depends, to some extent, upon the character of the weather. In gloomy weather we are, of course, apt to be depressed, and in fair weather exhilia-rated. When the atmosphere is stimulat-ing the mental and physical energies are expansed.

Starting from these generally recognized facts, a well-known scientist at Washing-ton has made a study of the effects of the ton has made a study of the effects of the weather on human conduct, the results of which are rather surprising. He shows, by a system of tabulation, that misdemeanors involving violence, such as assaults, are more common in bright weather, and that the same is true of suicides. On the other band, mental errors, such as mistakes in bank figures, are more common in dauge bank figures, are more common in damp,

hank ingures, are more common in damp, rainy weather. The scientist's inference is that the ex-cess of energy produced by a bracing con-dition of the atr is responsible for more vi-olence than is the "ugly temper" caused by bad weather, because the latter, while lowering the spirits, diminishes the activi-ty of men.

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
